Medical Billing and Coding Certificate / Medical Office Assistant Certificate These two certificates are complimentary programs designed to provide a comprehensive understanding of the skills required for work in health care institutions, nursing homes, physicians' offices, community health groups, insurance companies, billing companies and other health care centers. Students are admitted to the program in the fall and spring. Note that the Medical Office Assistant Certificate includes the first six courses in the Medical Billing and Coding program as well as the Medical Office Procedures course. **Required: All students must submit a High School Diploma or GED and a \$25 certificate fee before starting the second class of the Medical Billing and Coding Certificate Program.**

Medical Records Analysis **\$349**

Become familiar with the organization of patients' medical records. Learn the use of different forms and reports used in documenting patient progress. Identify the face sheet, discharge summary progress note, and doctor's orders, as well as the operative, pathology, laboratory, radiology and EKG reports. **Textbook is required and is not included in course price.**

The International Classification of Diseases (ICD) includes diagnosis and procedure codes. Learn all practices, characteristics and conventions of ICD-9-CM Coding, which are necessary to perform functions accurately for maximum reimbursement to the healthcare agency. Become familiar with patient accounts, case histories and actual parts of a medical record. Various reports such as pathology, laboratory, x-ray and operative reports will be used. **Textbook is required and is not included in course price.**

(NEW) Accelerated CASAC Certificate for Working Professionals The Accelerated CASAC Certificate Program at Medgar Evers College School of Professional and Community Development was designed to appeal to substance abuse counselors, social workers, and other health care professionals who are looking for an accelerated pursuit towards the completion of their CASAC Educational Requirements.



The Accelerated Program offers anywhere between 25 to a full 350 credit hours of education as set forth by the Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services (OASAS) to qualify for the CASAC – Training Certificate (CASAC-T), Certified Prevention Professional Certificate (CPP), Certified Prevention Specialist Certificate (CPS) and CASAC Certificate. If this program is attended full time, students can complete this program in as little as 10 – 12 months. After each course is completed an official certificate of completion is issued. During the CASAC Application Workshop each student will be assisted personally with their OASAS application. During the Free Orientation session of the program, each student will have a full career consultation and certificate planning session as to determine exactly which classes they will need in order to complete their personal OASAS Certificate goal. Applicants of the OASAS Certifications are required to take a written examination after completing their educational and work experience requirements. The Accelerated Program has a Tutorial Course complete with a 150 question multiple choice written examination. **Other benefits of this program include: Assistance with internship placements, CASAC job search assistance, and resume reviews.**

Our teaching approach is theoretical and experimental in the areas of individual, family and group counseling: Understanding the biological, social, physical, psychological or mental aspects of alcoholism and chemical dependency. CUNY Healthcare Interpreter Training Program: Level One

Introduction to Spanish/English Healthcare Interpreting (45 hrs) \$750

This course offers participants a basic understanding of the role of the Spanish-English interpreter in healthcare settings. The course provides an opportunity to acquire knowledge and develop abilities and skills needed to meet the criteria established by the Standards of Practice of the International Medical Interpreters Association and the Code of Ethics of the National Council on Interpreting in Healthcare. This introductory course is intended for bilingual healthcare staff and other individuals who are interested in interpreting careers in the healthcare setting. Participants will learn and practice basic skills such as how to manage communication; how to recognize and deal with ethical issues and cultural conflicts; clinicians' roles and expectations, American culture; health beliefs and practices in the Spanish speaking community; and the importance of interpreted communication in providing access to quality healthcare. The course introduces diverse exercises, including role-plays, to build skills mastery of techniques for consecutive interpreting: active listening, recall, and accuracy in relaying what has been said in either language. Finally, attention is given to basic medical vocabulary and how to build a personal bilingual glossary of words commonly encountered when interpreting healthcare interactions. The textbook for this course is Culturesmart's *The Essential Piece*, which has been widely used for training programs throughout the U.S..

Required: *Students must have a GED or High School Diploma and must be bilingual with both English and Spanish Language fluency. A language proficiency test will be administered to determine eligibility. Participants with experience doing medical interpretation, but with no prior training may enroll. Level One Fee: \$750. Books and Exit Certificate Exam not included in course price.*

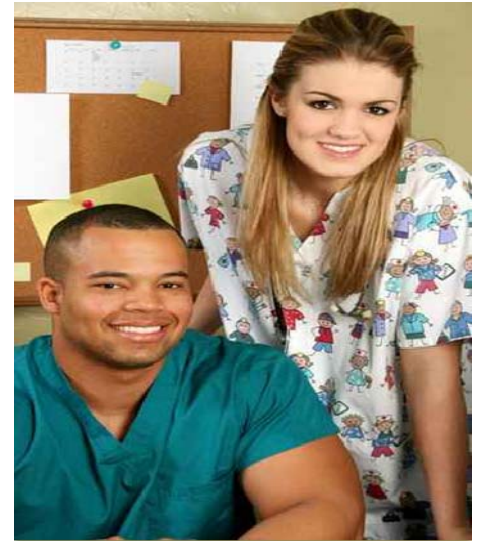
