Medgar Evers College (MEC), a nationally recognized leader in urbanserving education, is one of twentyfive colleges within the dynamic City University New York (CUNY) system. Founded in 1970, Medgar Evers College is named in honor of slain civil rights leader Medgar Wiley Evers (1925–1963). Framed within the context of liberal education, the College maintains high quality, professional, and career-oriented undergraduate degree programs.

Medgar Evers College was established with a mandate to meet the educational and social needs of the Central Brooklyn community, currently enrolling 7,000 students in degree programs.

The College exceeds the national average of student-to-faculty ratio, resulting in a personalized educational experience and individualized support services. Our accomplished faculty comprises over 208 full-time members who must maintain current portfolios of research and scholarship. They include some of the best and brightest in academia, boasting several Fulbright Scholars, a Guggenheim Fellow, and many respected researchers.

#### STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION

The executive body of the SGA (president, day vice president, evening vice president, corresponding secretary, recording secretary, and treasurer) and elected class representatives constitute the Student Council.

The SGA oversees a variety of student activities, including club budgets, formation of new clubs, and sponsorship of co-curricular programs that provide intellectual, cultural, and social value for the entire student body. The SGA also participates in the College's decision-making processes, which have a direct impact on the overall student experience.

#### TRANSITION ACADEMY

The Transition Academy was established to assist Medgar Evers College students in need. Our services help students navigate New York City's complex systems to find adequate housing, address food and clothing insecurities, and foster a sense of wellbeing and peace of mind.

The Cougar Country Food Pantry offers nutritionally balanced, non-perishable food items to students who are enrolled at the College and are experiencing food insecurity.

Other assistance includes advocacy and referrals for students facing domestic violence, counseling referrals, job placement, and appropriate clothing for job interviews.

#### DIFFERENTLY-ABLED STUDENTS

### Office of Accessibility and Accommodation Services is

committed to helping students with disabilities obtain equal access to academic and programmatic services.

We acknowledge that not all disabilities are visible or physical in nature, and we address those student needs accordingly.

We seek to maintain a campus culture that encourages all students to achieve their goals while recognizing and embracing individual differences.

Toward that end, we are responsible for ensuring that all individuals with documented disabilities receive appropriate accommodations.

We also provide additional services that include academic, vocational, and rehabilitation counseling; individual or group tutoring; note-taking services; textbooks in alternate formats; coordination of sign language interpreting services; and many others.

#### ELLA BAKER CHILDCARE CENTER

The Ella Baker/Charles Romain Child Development Center is our campus-based child care program, which offers both pre-school and after-school programs.

The Center is committed to meeting the needs of the child while supporting the professional growth of the student-parent. We maintain a loving, nurturing, and creative environment for children.

Our programs are built on the philosophy that each child is a unique individual, and we are responsive to their social, emotional, intellectual, and physical needs.

We provide developmentally appropriate activities that focus on the process of learning and encourage the joy of learning.

We also offer pre-kindergarten as part of the Department of Education's Pre-K for All program.

We plan to begin offering Mandarin language classes in the upcoming semesters.





#### MALE DEVELOPMENT AND EMPOWERMENT CENTER (MDEC)

Since it was founded in 2000, **MDEC** has focused on increasing the enrollment and graduation rates of under-represented populations, particularly male students. MDEC serves as a community hub for male students to connect, become involved, and develop into leaders and advocates. We give male students the tools they need to complete their degrees and go on to realize their professional and personal goals. Our activities foster academic achievement, social interaction, and individual development. We encourage male students to get involved in their communities as we instill the importance of giving back and a sense of civic responsibility. Through the Pi Eta Kappa Honor Society and Men of Determination, we give male students an opportunity to hone their leadership skills.

#### WOMEN'S CENTER

Founded in 1982 by a coalition of students, faculty, staff, and community members, the **Center for Women's Development (CWD)** supports the self-actualization of female students by providing specialized resources to assist them in their pursuit of higher education. The Center's services and programs promote self-empowerment, self-awareness, and self-respect as female students navigate their educational journeys. Through counseling, advocacy, referrals, educational forums, and events, we help female students cope with myriad issues that would otherwise derail their successful progress towards their degrees.





#### VETS ON CAMPUS

The Office of Veteran and Military Services aims to ease the transition from service member to student by providing culturally-responsive admissions, academic, and personal support to student-veterans and their dependents. Veteran peer mentors and social work interns provide assistance with readjustment, tutoring, GI Bill and VA benefit applications, case management, and most importantly, outreach and support. Our primary goal is to establish a sense of community and camaraderie for student-veterans on campus. The change from a regimented military lifestyle to the selfdirected environment of higher education requires a significant shift in mindset, and fellow veterans who have progressed from service member to student are available to help. Student veterans can turn life experience into college credit by developing a professional portfolio and through our College Level Exam Program (CLEP).

#### STUDY ABROAD

The **study abroad** program provides our students with intentional educational experiences on a global scale. With academic programs in the Caribbean, Africa, China, and beyond, our students participate in first-hand cultural exchanges while advancing their studies. Once they return home, these students bring an international perspective back to our campus and inspire fellow students to pursue their own experiences abroad. The Office of Study Abroad supports faculty-led initiatives as the cornerstone of our study abroad program. The Office also collaborates with international institutions and professional organizations to create expanded opportunities for international education, including student exchange, faculty exchange, joint research, and other ventures. Our programs provide students with global perspectives that will serve them after graduation and well into thier professional careers.





#### **INTERNSHIPS**

In today's highly competitive job market, **internships** have become an essential component of the undergraduate experience. For students, internships are often their first foray into the world of work. Internships also provide an opportunity for students to explore their career options and gain professional skills and experience that will position them for success after graduation. Our students have interned at companies and institutions such as Google, NASA, the Brooklyn Navy Yard, the Brooklyn Museum of Art, the Brooklyn Academy of Music, New York City Parks and Recreation, among others.

#### CAREER SERVICES

We provide exceptional **career development services** that help students apply their education and experiences toward advancing their career goals over a lifetime.

We create individualized career plans for students to identify and explore career options they might pursue, and implement an effective strategy to attain their desired career outcomes.

Through guidance, workshops, and co-curricular programming, students have the opportunity to become lifelong custodians of their professional experiences. Students learn about their skills and interests and how to confidently articulate them on résumés, cover letters, personal statements, and in interviews.

Over the coming semesters, Career Services will offer students the opportunity to earn digital badges through an online credentialing system that can be easily shared with employers. Professional credentials will include project management, Microsoft Office, and Google IT certifications.

From mock interviews and executive guest speakers, to internship recruitment, and assistance with obtaining professional attire, we provide a multitude of resources that help students make connections and create pathways to the future.



## CITY UNIVERSITY OF NEW YORK (CUNY) PROGRAMS AT MEDGAR EVERS COLLEGE

Medgar Evers College participates in a number of CUNY programs that create a supportive network to ensure student persistence and success.



The Percy Ellis Sutton Search for Education, Elevation, and Knowledge (SEEK) is the higher education opportunity program that assists capable students who otherwise might not be able to attend college. Talented and motivated students who qualify receive additional financial aid, get personalized counseling and academic advisement, and join a community of fellow students who are serious about completing their degrees.



**College Now** is a collaborative program between CUNY and the New York City Department of Education to strengthen students' preparation for college. The program provides access to college-credit courses, college-preparatory courses and activities, **COLLEGENOW** experiential-based summer programs, campus facilities, and cultural programs.



The Accelerated Study in Associate Programs (ASAP) helps students complete their associate degrees within three years. Financial, academic, and personal assistance includes career counseling, tutoring, waivers for tuition

and fees, MTA MetroCards, and discounted textbooks. ASAP students are more likely to finish their associate degrees and go on to pursue baccalaureate studies.

# HOW TO APPLY

#### FRESHMAN STUDENTS

To apply as a **freshman student**, you must meet the following requirements and complete these steps:

- Complete and submit the CUNY application at <u>www.cuny.edu/admissions/undergraduate/apply</u>.
- Submit the \$65 application fee.
- Submit proof of high school graduation. Official high school transcripts and diplomas or official GED or TASC scores and certificates are accepted.
- Applicants must have a minimum high school GPA of 65, a GED score of 2250, or a TASC score of 2500.
- Applicants applying to a four-year degree program must have a minimum high school GPA of 80, a GED score of 2250, or a TASC score 2500.

#### TRANSFER STUDENTS

You are considered a transfer student if you have previously attended any college, university, or proprietary school since graduating from high school or secondary school.

To apply as a **transfer student**, you must meet the following requirements and complete these steps:

- Complete and submit the CUNY application at <u>www.cuny.edu/admissions/undergraduate/apply</u>.
- Submit the \$70 application fee.
- Submit official college transcript(s) from all colleges previously attended.
- Applicants must have a minimum 2.0 GPA from a CUNY college or a 2.2 GPA from a non-CUNY college.
- Submit proof of high school graduation. Official high school transcripts and diplomas or official GED or TASC scores and certificates are accepted.

#### NON-DEGREE STUDENTS

If you are interested in taking a few credit-bearing, collegelevel courses but not pursuing a degree, you may apply as a non-degree student. This includes visiting students from other colleges and students who have already earned a degree.

To apply as a **non-degree student**, you must meet the following requirements and complete these steps:

- Complete the <u>non-degree application</u> and submit it by email along with official transcripts to <u>admissions-</u> <u>docs@mec.cuny.edu</u>. Be sure to include "Non-Degree Application" in the subject line.
- Submit official college transcript(s) from all institutions previously attended.
- Submit proof of high school graduation. Official high school transcripts and diplomas or official GED or TASC scores and certificates are accepted.
- Submit the \$65 application fee.
- Visiting students may be eligible to receive financial aid if they enroll in classes at Medgar Evers College. They must request the Consortium Agreement and obtain permission from their "home institutions" prior to enrolling at Medgar Evers College. Federal regulations allow only one institution to award federal financial aid. The Consortium Agreement allows students to use some of their federal student aid (Pell Grant, direct subsidized and unsubsidized loans, direct PLUS loans), and TAP (if the student is a New York State resident attending a New York State School full-time) at another approved school or program.

#### **RE-ADMITTED STUDENTS**

Applicants who have registered for courses at Medgar Evers College in a previous semester and have not attended for one or more semesters thereafter will need to file for readmission.

To file for **re-admission**, you must meet the following requirements and complete these steps:

- Applicants must not have any outstanding "holds" on their academic records.
- Applicants must be in good academic standing by maintaining a minimum 2.0 cumulative GPA while attending Medgar Evers College or any other CUNY institution(s).
- Complete the <u>re-admission application</u> and submit it by email to <u>admissions-docs@mec.cuny.edu</u>. If you attended any non-CUNY college since you last attended Medgar Evers College, include official transcripts with your readmission application. Be sure to include "Re-Admission Application" in the subject line.
- Submit the \$20 non-refundable application processing fee.
- Applicants who were not in attendance for two or more semesters must show proof of <u>New York State residency</u>. Complete and email the New York state residency form with supporting documents to
  - admissions-docs@mec.cuny.edu
- Applicants with a cumulative GPA of less than 2.0 must file a petition for reinstatement. Once the petition has been approved, students can submit an application for readmission. For more information about the reinstatement process, email the Academic Appeals Committee at <u>ARAC@mec.cuny.edu</u>.

## FINANCING YOUR EDUCATION

The Office of Financial Aid ensures that all eligible students are able to finance their education at Medgar Evers College. The amount of assistance a student receives is established by federal, state, and institutional guidelines. Students are encouraged to explore all financial aid options, including:

- <u>Grants</u>, including federal Pell grants, Tuition Assistance Program (TAP), and Aid for Part-Time Students (APTS)
- Loans
- <u>Scholarships</u>
- Work-Study Programs

#### COMPLETING THE FREE APPLICATION FOR FEDERAL STUDENT AID (FAFSA)

The first step in determining whether you are eligible for financial aid is to complete the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid). You can complete the FAFSA online at <u>www.fafsa.ed.gov</u>.

Before you begin, gather your most recent federal and state tax returns, your Social Security number, your driver's license number (if you have one), your Alien Registration number (if you are not a U.S. citizen), along with other financial documentation. Check <u>this page</u> for more information and a complete list of documents needed before you apply.

Visit the Office of Financial Aid's <u>webpage</u> for step-bystep instructions and assistance with filing the FAFSA online.

After submitting the FAFSA, you will see a confirmation page indicating your EFC (Expected Family Contribution). This amount is used to determine your eligibility for need-based federal aid. Next, an award letter will be sent to your Medgar Evers College (MEC) email address outlining your financial aid package. Be sure to check regularly since the award letter will only be sent to your MEC email address.
